# **NHS 111 Campaign**

Earlier this week Public Health England launched a new campaign in London (also the Midlands and East) to make people aware of the NHS 111 service. Research has shown that while public awareness of NHS 111 is high and still increasing, understanding of the role of service is low and there are still far too many people attending A&E who could, and should, be treated elsewhere. You may already have seen TV adverts or picked up a leaflet from the Practice, a hospital or your dentist. The campaign will run for eight weeks.

#### Why is this Winter's 'Flu such a Problem?

For those with a more scientific mind there was an interesting article in *Scientific American* on 9 January on why this year's 'flu is a particular problem. Essentially one of the circulating strains (called H3N2) has mutated since the vaccine was initially created – unusually this appears to have happened both "in the wild" and within the vaccine production process. H3N2 is also more persistent and infectious and it is known that years where it is the dominant strain are generally the worst years for 'flu. That's no consolation if you are unlucky enough to get the 'flu, so please try to stay healthy!
